Abstract

The purpose of this research study is to explore the pathways through which capacity building as both, an enabler and a form of climate action is being coproduced within the bodies and institutions under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). Given the diversity in climate impacts and responses globally, I will carry out a case study analysis to explore how and why only a few particular framings of capacity building for climate action dominate within the UNFCCC. First, I will explore coproduction of capacity building across three distinct and salient boundaries of climate knowledge that are used to organize and manage climate action in UNFCCC spaces: the science-policy-society boundary, the Global North-Global South boundary, and the global-local boundary.

Second, I will identify opportunities and challenges for opening diverse and socially just forms of climate action through capacity building in UNFCCC spaces. I will use qualitative methods for data collection and analysis, including semi-structured interviews, document analysis and participant observations. Third, integrating insights from international development and theories of education and social change, I will propose a range of capacities for furthering the goals of climate justice through capacity building for climate action.
